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Hippotherapy Coming This Summer

Many people are often surprised to learn that my Bachelor's degree is actually in the field of animal science, not communication disorders or some other field related to my current profession.

My decision to change to speech-language pathology stemmed from a pivotal experience in my junior year of college--the opportunity to volunteer for the University Therapeutic Riding Center, a Hippotherapy and Therapeutic Riding program created by Texas Tech University and University Medical Center to help kiddos with special needs.

Over the next year, my life was transformed as I watched a 3-year-old girl with Down Syndrome speak her first word, a child with autism laugh his heart out, and many other children have experiences that they were "unlikely" to have.

Contrary to the first impression of many, hippotherapy is not "therapy on a hippopotamus" (although, that thought is quite amusing). Hippotherapy is actually therapy provided on horseback, and it's an up-and-coming therapy modality that more facilities are embracing and incorporating into traditional therapy practices. It is

a treatment strategy that utilizes the rhythmic, repetitive movement of equine animals (horses, ponies, etc.) to improve a person's body and function, including trunk strength and balance, endurance, weight bearing, motor planning, respiratory control, and sensory processing. Not only are results often seen physically, but riders also appear to benefit mentally and emotionally, as well. In short, it's a full-body experience to benefit the whole person!



“Raising a Sensory Smart Child”

-The Definitive Handbook for Helping Your Child with Sensory Processing Issues





“So I drop my kid off for Occupational Therapy, and when I pick him up, he is a completely different kiddo. What’s the secret?” If the phrase “sensory processing disorder” (SPD) is new to you or if you don’t fully understand what the swings and ball pit are all about at All For Kids, put “Raising a Sensory Smart Child” on your list of things to read. Co-written by a mother and an Occupational Therapist, this book is not only for those new to the diagnosis of SPD, but it offers savvy parents even more ideas for interacting and engaging with their child. The book is reader friendly and an invaluable resource for parents. It begins by explaining how the senses work and how they are integrated, setting the foundation for recognizing and understanding a child’s sensory issues. The bulk of the book gives idea after idea for addressing specific sensory needs in everyday situations, such as meal time, and for special situations, such as a birthday party. In addition, the book lists websites, organizations, and companies that sell toys and equipment for kids with sensory issues. “Raising a Sensory Smart Child” is well worth a thorough read, but is also organized in a way that makes it convenient to find pertinent information you may be seeking. Ask the front desk or your therapist about borrowing Raising a Sensory Smart Child from our Lending Library at All For Kids.

All For Kids is starting a social group for boys ages 8-13!

The group will take place on Wednesdays from 4:30-6:00 starting June 20th and continue through the summer to August 29th. Occupational therapist, Kalia Cook, and speech therapist, Nichole LaChance, will work together with the boys using ideas from SUPERFLEX: A Superhero Social Thinking Curriculum. The curriculum brings kids through different scenarios that involve using their brains and controlling their bodies to think of others and defeat any number of Unthinkables they may encounter in their daily lives. Unthinkables are attitudes and behaviors that take shape into characters that can take over everyone’s brains to make them less flexible thinkers. With Superflex strategies, the kids learn to defeat the likes of Rockbrain (he makes people get stuck on their own ideas), One-Sided Sid (he gets people to only talk about themselves), or even Glassman (he makes people have huge upset reactions). Superflex strategies encourage the kids to become social thinkers through understanding different perspectives, problem solving, flexible thinking, and provides methods for changing their own thinking and behavior. Call the clinic to inquire about future sessions.
