What's with the timers?

The holiday season is filled with new experiences and unexpected surprises. Many of us look forward to this season because it provides us with a break from the monotony of life, a breath from the predictable ins and outs of the grind. Many of us enjoy sharing a special meal and the opportunity to provide the gift of time and attention to friends and family we may not otherwise see. If you are a parent of a child that has difficulty understanding transitions or unexpected experiences, time might be something of which there is never enough, and it takes everything in you to not get strangled in the hands of it. You may even want to fast forward to January where you can be back to your normal routine with predictable happenings.

Unfortunately, the world will not let you.

Instead, you function in the extra chaos with whatever tools you may have to harness time. We are here to provide you with tools! One of the tools that therapists use on a regular basis is a timer. Time itself is an abstract concept: "Just a minute!" "This is your five minute warning." "It's time to clean up soon." Does your child understand that 5 minutes may not be 60 seconds repeated 5 times, but actually just until your adult conversation is over? A timer can be used in various ways to make such an abstract concept literal. Kids function well with literal, visual strategies.

The way time is measured may be different depending on how your child understands your expectations. We use numbered countdown timers, finger countdown timers, visual timers, Time Timers...the list goes on! Ask your therapist (especially the occupational therapists) about the timers outlined below and whether or not they would be helpful for structuring the days to come.

Timer Name	You could use this if	This timer would not work well if
Time Timer (also available as an app)	 Your child understands a clock face and can attend to the timer clock face. Your child can learn this cue: "More red, more play. All done red, all done play." Your child attends to color and/or numbers. 	-Your child is never stationary. -Your child does not care about colors or numbers.
Visual Timer (fingers, white squares, dinosaurs, cars)	 Your child has no understanding of numbers. Your child has limited verbal abilities. You need a timer everywhere you go. Your child is a visual learner. 	-Your child does not attend to you visually. -The caregiver is unable to balance managing transitions and completing their task.
Countdown Timer	 Your child knows their numbers. Your child likes and understands that numbers go in an order. Your child needs an auditory signal to indicate "Done". You have easy access to a phone, watch, or kitchen timer. 	-Your child does not understand that a countdown leads to something. -Your child does not understand the function of numbers. -Our child is sensitive to a beeping noise.
